Academic articles: structure and content

- ► Kubota's article uses a **traditional 5-part structure**
 - 1. Introduction
 - 2. Literature Review
 - 3. Methodology
 - 4. Results
 - 5. Conclusion

This structure is standard in most academic fields, but you may encounter some exceptions

Introduction: content and function

Generally Kubota (2011) State the topic Eikaiwa are connected to social inclusion—the communities that Provide relevant background learners want to belong to information Definitions of key concepts For many, the imagined community of "English users" is dominated by images of white native speakers Explain why investigating the topic is important Connect the topic to larger "I will demonstrate how learning social issues or concerns eikaiwa as a way of seeking inclusion in an English-speaking imagined community can be best understood Briefly summarize the overall as a form of leisure and purpose of the study and the main

consumption." (p. 474)

Literature Review: content and function

Generally

- Examine what others have written about the topic
 - Summary
 - Synthesis (making comparisons between sources)
- Identify limitations of previous studies
- Make an argument for why the current study is necessary

Kubota (2011)

- Ways of understanding reasons for language learning
 - Motivation (psychological)
 - **Investment** (social/political)
 - Leisure / consumption (personal enjoyment and pleasure)
- Eikaiwa companies use images of white men to provoke akogare and support unequal power relationships
- "Viewing language learning as leisure and consumption provides second language research with a new conceptual dimension..." (p.476)

English / white native speakers

> More powerful

Less powerful

Other languages / non-white multilinguals

Methodology: content and function

- State the specific goals for the research project, often in the form of research questions
- Explain how research was designed and conducted
 - ► Studies on humans: number of participants, participant characteristics (age, gender, etc.)
 - Laboratory studies: variables and control, number of trials
 - Studies on texts: number and type of texts included

Methodology: content and function

- Explain what type of data was obtained
 - ► Studies on humans: interview, survey, focus group, psychological test, etc., etc.
 - Note: in some studies, the author does not obtain original data but rather constructs an argument on the basis of previous research

Results: content and function

- Report research findings
- Analyze findings in order to answer the research questions
 - ▶ Qualitative studies: report themes, patterns, and trends in the data
 - ► Quantitative studies: frequencies, percentages, and statistical analysis

Discussion: content and function

Compare the results of the present study to results of previous studies

- Discuss the larger implications of the present study's findings
 - ▶ What the results suggest about other **situations** and **contexts**
- Make suggestions for future research
