

What is a Sister City?

"Twin Town"

"Friendship City"

A BROAD-BASED, LONG-TERM PARTNERSHIP BETWEEN TWO COMMUNITIES IN TWO COUNTRIES.

A CITY CAN HAVE MULTIPLE SISTER CITIES

EACH SISTER CITY ORGANIZATION IS INDEPENDENT AND VARIES IN SIZE

PURSUE SHARED AREAS OF INDUSTRY/INTEREST THAT ARE IMPORTANT TO THEM

A quick history of Sister City Ties

PRE-WWII

836: PADERBORN, GERMANY AND LE MANS, FRANCE FORMED THE FIRST RECOGNIZED SISTER RELATIONSHIP.

1920: KEIGHLEY, ENGLAND AND POIX-DU-NORD, FRANCE FORMED THE FIRST LEGALLY RECORDED SISTER CITY RELATIONSHIP

WWI & WWII - SISTER CITY AS AN ACT OF PEACEBUILDING

A quick history of Sister City Ties

POST-WWII

1945: COVENTRY, ENGLAND, STALINGRAD, RUSSIA AND LATER DRESDEN, GERMANY FORM TRI-SISTER CITY - ALL THREE CITIES WERE HEAVILY BOMBED DURING WWII

1945-46: BATH, ENGLAND FORMED AN "ALKMAAR ADOPTION SISTER COMMITTEE" WITH ALKMAAR, DENMARK. CHILDREN FROM EACH CITY TOOK PART IN EXCHANGES DURING 1945 AND 1946.

1955: ST. PAUL, MINNESOTA (US) AND NAGASAKI, JAPAN FORM SISTER CITY RELATIONSHIP ON PEARL HARBOR DAY.

US-JAPAN SISTER CITIES

451 SISTER CITIES (2018)

25% of Japan's overall sister ties.

1ST SISTERS: NAGASAKI & ST.PAUL

Established in 1955 on "Pearl Harbor Day" as a sign of peace.

US-JAPAN ART INITIATIVES: HIROSHIMA & SANTA FE

An exchange of children's art started by Chuzo Tamotzu in 1953


INETEEN OF THE CREW OF AN AMER ICAN SHIP LOST.

YOKOHAMA, Nov. 7.-The American shill neseborough, Capt. Ericsson, from Hlogo vit okadadi for New-York, has been wrecked or e northwest coast of Japan. Mincteen of he ow were drowned.

D. B. Dearborn, the agent of the Cheseborougi inis port, says that she was owned by Arthu: wall & Co. of Bath, Me. She was built in 78 and measured 1,461 tons. Her dimension ere: Length, 204 feet; breadth of beam, 40 et, and depth of hold, 24 feet. She was a full gged clipper, and rated in the first class. She id made a number of voyages between this ort and San Francisco.

Maine & Aomori

The Cheseborough from Bath, Maine, shipwrecked off of the coast of Shariki village in Aomori (Tsugaru Village today).

The people of Shariki village saved survivors from that shipwreck, nursed them back to health, and helped them get back to the United States. It is an event in our shared histories that we decided to celebrate by establishing an official sister state relationship.

A visible and tangible object(s) that presents the forms and practices within a society, including those of everyday life, popular culture, and high culture.


CULTURAL IMAGES:
